Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) – Home Energy Rebates	Heat Pump Water Heater	<ul> <li>Home Electrification and Appliance Rebate (HEAR): offers incomespecific, point-of-sale rebates for home heat pump projects.</li> <li>Low-income households (under 80% of the area median income): 100% of costs covered, up to \$1,750</li> <li>Moderate-income households (80 – 150% of area median income): 50% of costs covered, up to \$1,750</li> <li>NOTE: If you are using HEAR for other home electrification upgrades (i.e., heat pump, heat pump hot water heater, electric panel installation, electric appliances), there is a total cap of \$14,000 for all qualifying projects.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Low-income households can apply to NYSERDA's EmPower+ program to access HEAR rebates for insulation/air sealing, electrical upgrades, heat pumps, and heat pump water heaters. See Eligibility Guidelines here.</li> <li>Moderate-income households can expect HEAR rebates to become available in 2025. Rebates cannot be applied retroactively.</li> <li>Total amount claimed from HEAR cannot exceed \$14,000 (if receiving rebates for multiple projects, i.e. insulation, heat pumps, electrical upgrades)</li> </ul>
